- † Today we pause to remember military and civilian servicemen and women, those who have lost their life in World Wars and later conflicts around the world.
- On 3 August 1914 Sir Edward Grey made his famous quote: 'The lamps are going out all over Europe, we shall not see them lit again in our lifetime'. Since then the UK has been involved in 44 recognised wars and conflicts
- † First held on 11 November 1919, King George V asked the public to observe a silence at 11am, one year after the end of World War One so "the thoughts of everyone may be concentrated on reverent remembrance of the glorious dead".
- Many today will hear these words: "When you go home, tell them of us and say - For your tomorrow, we gave our today".
